#### Major national journalism conference opens next week

On Dec. 5, the three-day <u>"Journalism under Fire"</u> conference opens at the Santa Fe Convention Center, featuring 51 journalists from around the world. The **Santa Fe Council on** 

International Relations has packed the sessions:

Journalism Co Under Fire

• Day One, Dec. 5, is Freedom of the Press, Fake News, Persecution, and Exile.

• Day Two, Dec. 6, is Journalism in Mexico, at the US-Mexico Border, and Around the World.

• Day Three, Dec. 7, is Local Journalism: Corporatization, Consolidation and Change.

Confirmed speakers include Pulitzer Prize winning Dana Priest, of the Washington Post; Olga Yurkova,

Ukrainian journalist and TED Fellow; Arbana Xharra, Kosovan investigative journalist; and freelancer Jenni Monet, of Laguna Pueblo, who won awards for her coverage of the Dakota Access pipeline protest.

Don't miss <u>the grand opening event</u> on Tuesday, Dec. 4<sup>th</sup>, which is free to New Mexico journalists, and features a panel on Justice for Journalists under Fire with Jason Rezaian, of WaPo; Courtney Radsch, CPJ; **Jenni Monet**, indigenous national freelance journalist; and Hannah Allam, BuzzFeed. It starts at 6 p.m. and ends at around 8:30 p.m. at the Convention Center.

NMPW board member **Sherry Robinson** will moderate a panel on community journalism as NMPW's contribution to the event.

Visual exhibitions include:

- Photographs of the U.S.-Mexico border by Pulitzer-Prize winning photojournalist Don Bartletti and Santa Fe's own Morgan Smith.
- Political cartoons by Ann Telnaes, of the Washington Post; KAL, of the Economist; Nikahang Kowsar, exiled Iranian political cartoonist; and Ricardo Caté, of the Santa Fe New Mexican.
- A virtual reality simulation in which the viewer becomes a journalist interrogated in one of Iran's most notorious prisons.

• A postcard-writing campaign staged by the Committee to Protect Journalists. Participants can compose postcards to imprisoned journalists around the world.

NMPW board members thanked the Albuquerque Journal for publishing Jamal Khashoggi's final Washington Post column, entitled "Arab voices desperately need a platform." "As a journalist, Mr. Khashoggi braved constant death threats to write about freedom concerns in Arab nations," wrote President Sherri Burr. "We acknowledge that Mr. Khashoggi's courageous reporting resulted in the ultimate sacrifice – his life."


