When was the last time something made you really think? Or inspired you to find a way to talk about things important in your life?

Karen Wentworth and her committee from Albuquerque Press Women have crafted this year's annual conference to do just that.

The 2016 NMPW annual conference will be held April 22 and 23 at the Bosque Center of the Episcopal Diocese of the Rio Grande. Conference fee is \$150. Rooms at Bosque Center are \$45 per night. Details about the Center are at <u>bosquecenter.org</u>.

Having gotten that bit of business out of the way, let's consider the import of this year's conference theme — Shaping the Future of New Mexico: Our role as citizens and journalists.

These are trying times ... with a Presidential election that seems to have run off the rails of common courtesy ... with reports of corruption among politicians and belligerence among certain segments of the populace ... with daily accounts of shootings. Each of us has to consider how to react not only as a citizen but also as a professional communicator. The conference has been designed to assist.

Our Saturday banquet keynote speaker will be Winthrop Quigley, columnist for the Albuquerque Journal. Here's what Quigley wrote for the UNM website on liberal arts & integrative studies:

"I was in college off and on, mostly off, for several years once I graduated from high school. I was already pretty well established in the work place when I decided it was time to work toward a degree. By that time, I knew who I was, and I knew what I wanted to do. I wanted to understand economics and get a solid foundation in statistics and mathematics so I could continue my studies for a master's degree in business with a finance concentration. The BUS program was ideal for me because it was designed for someone who was well along into adulthood and who already knew what academic work was essential to achieving well understood, personal goals. I had been a newspaper reporter when I started the BUS program, but I changed to a business career. I held several senior level jobs, mostly in the computer industry, mostly doing product development. Then in 2000, I returned to the newspaper business. I wrote first for the business page. These days I'm a columnist."

His keynote address should be enlightening.

Quigley's talk, of course, is at the end of the conference. Throughout Saturday, you can take part in three panel discussions.

Panel #1: Land and Water with Laura Paskus, Anita Miller, Laura McCarthy, and moderator Sherry Robinson will look at how media cover land and water issues and what's missing.

Panel #2: Telling the Deep Truth with Alan Webber, Janice Arnold-Jones, and moderator Merilee Dannermann will explore how media cover important general issues.

Panel #3: Crime and Justice with Peter St. Cyr, Judith Nakamura, and moderator Scott Sandin will examine how media cover crime and justice and what is missing.

There will also be the pleasurable Zia Award Luncheon — not only good food but the joy of listening to winners read from their books.

And there are two receptions, Friday and Saturday, with desserts, appetizers, and wine.

Who's Our Next Communicator of Achievement?

It's that time of year again, time to start thinking about nominating someone from your affiliate for the prestigious Communicator of Achievement.

The Communicator of Achievement Award is the highest honor bestowed by New Mexico Press Women and the National Federation of Press Women upon those members who have distinguished themselves within and beyond their profession. The recipient will travel to Wichita, KS, in early September, where she or he will compete with other nominees from other states. The national winner is recognized for exceptional achievement in the communications field, service to NFPW and to the community. The COA Award winner and the runner-up are announced at the Communicator of Achievement Award Banquet at NFPW's annual conference. Each nominee is featured in NFPW's AGENDA newsletter prior to the conference and spotlighted at the awards banquet.

The most recent members of NMPW who have been honored as Communicator of Achievement are: Anne Hillerman, 2015; Sherri Burr, 2014; Carol Kreis, 2013; Cheryl Fallstead, 2012; Bud Russo, 2011; R. Thomas Berner, 2010; Susan Walton, 2009; Cary Herz, 2008; Connie Gotsch, 2007; and Emily Drabanski, 2006. The Communicator of Achievement Award was established in the early 1960s as Women of Achievement. It was changed to CoA in 1991. The first recipient was Frankie McCarty in 1963

All nominees must be living members, in good standing for at least two years in an affiliate and NFPW (To check on a member's status, please e-mail <u>presswomen@aol.com</u>.) A previous nominee can be named by an affiliate again, as long as he or she has not been honored as NFPW's national COA winner. NMFOG Elects New Board Members, Officers

In NMPW's continuing interest in First Amendment rights and transparency in government, the following news release regarding New Mexico Foundation for Open Government is reproduced.

Carl Baldwin, Janice Arnold-Jones, Michael Melody and Sylvia Ulloa to join transparency organization

ALBUQUERQUE - The New Mexico Foundation for Open Government has elected new officers and members to its board of directors to assume office January 1.

At its November meeting, the NMFOG board elected the following officers, all long-time members of the nonprofit board -- Gregory Williams, president; Martin Salazar, president-elect; Billie Blair, secretary; and Robert Trapp, treasurer.

Williams is of counsel to Peifer, Hanson & Mullins and previously served as president of the board for the alumni association of the University of New Mexico School of Law. Salazar is the publisher and editor of the Las Vegas Optic and worked for the Albuquerque Journal. Blair was president of the Santa Fe Community Foundation and has a background in media, marketing and public policy. Trapp is the managing editor for the Rio Grande Sun.

The newly appointed at-large board members are Carl Baldwin, Janice Arnold-Jones, Michael Melody and Sylvia Ulloa.

Baldwin is a public servant, accountant and U.S. Air Force veteran. He has worked in the Office of the State Auditor and served on the Lea County Board of County Commissioners from 1987 to 1994. Baldwin currently owns a private accounting firm operating in Santa Fe and Hobbs.

Arnold-Jones is a former New Mexico State Legislator. She was a candidate for the 1st Congressional District in the 2012 election and ran in the Republican primary election for Governor in 2010. Arnold-Jones was honored by NMFOG in 2010 with the William S. Dixon First Amendment Freedom Award for her demonstrated commitment to government transparency.

Melody is the retired president and CEO of Sage Publications, Inc. He has held seniormanagement positions with academic publishing companies such as Houghton-Mifflin, Prentice-Hall and Macmillan Publishing Company. Melody currently serves as an officer of the board for the Santa Fe Symphony Orchestra and Chorus.

Ulloa is the managing editor of the Las Cruces Sun-News with 22 years of experience in newspaper journalism. Ulloa is a member of Investigative Reporters and Editors and was formerly an adjunct professor of journalism at San Jose State University.

Also re-elected to the NMFOG board for additional three-year terms were Kathi Bearden, Charles Peifer, Charles "Kip" Purcell, Billie Blair, Fred Nathan, Doug Turner and Dede Feldman.

"We are thrilled to welcome the new board members and incoming officers," Kathi Bearden, NMFOG president, said. "Their collective expertise in the areas of governance, law, finance, leadership and journalism will greatly enhance our organization's ability to protect the public's right to know.
