NMPW Announces its 2020 Communicator of Achievement

New Mexico Press Women Communicator of Achievement Chair Loretta Hall is pleased to announce the results of this year's Communicator of Achievement Competition. The winner, journalist Damien Willis, will compete in the 2020 National Federation of Press Women Communicator of Achievement Process, with the winner to be announced at the end of 2020.

Damien Willis

After being obsessed with newspapers from his teen years and studying writing in college, Willis found himself in an unexpected medium: radio. For 13 years, beginning 2001, he built an audience at Las Cruces' Hot 103 and was named Best DJ Personality by New Mexico Broadcasters Association in 2005.

In 2004, he began writing an entertainment column for the Las Cruces Sun-News, a labor of love that's continued through 800 consecutive weeks.

He has served as Public Information Officer for the Third Judicial District Attorney's office and as Director of Communications for Las Cruces Public Schools.

In 2019, he returned to journalism as lead reporter and coach for the Sun-News, editing the paper and developing newsroom talent while covering business.

He has contributed to various community and Press Women activities — including serving as secretary for Las Cruces Press Women, and secretary, vicepresident, and newsletter editor for New Mexico Press Women. He's been a member of National Federation of Press Women for the last three years.

Tools

IRE makes data training videos free for one year

IRE is relaunching its NICAR-Learn library of data tool tutorials, with new videos and free access for one year.

NICAR-Learn is a hub of almost 60 short, skill-based videos for journalists to learn tools, tricks and strategies for working with data. Unlike some online training platforms, you won't find any hour-long webinars on the site. Instead, most videos are under 10 minutes and designed for journalists to quickly learn a skill on demand. Access to NICAR-Learn typically costs \$25 per year for IRE members and \$40 for nonmembers. In response to the coronavirus pandemic, IRE is offering the service free for one year.

Current subscribers will receive a free one-year extension. After a year, anyone may subscribe at the standard rates. "During these uncertain economic times, IRE wants to be sure that journalists, students and professors have access to these tools," IRE Executive Director Doug Haddix said. Recipients were evaluated based on their career goals, essay, work samples, academic progress and faculty or employer support. The Northern Chapter of New Mexico Press Women made an additional contribution to the scholarship to honor their member Deb Farson, who passed in 2019.

Annalisa Miller

The first place 2020 scholarship winner of \$1,000 is Annalisa Miller, a sophomore majoring in Agricultural Communications and minoring in Journalism and Mass Communications at New Mexico State University. Miller serves as an assistant coordinator in New Mexico Agricultural Leadership. With a passion for agricultural advocacy, Miller manages the organization's social media, designs newsletters, and recruits new members. She is also a past president of the New Mexico Future Farmers of America Association. Her professor praised her ability to balance the demands of school, service responsibilities and work. Last fall, she completed a media relations internship at the Northern International Livestock Exposition.

The second place 2020 Doris Gregory Memorial Scholarship was awarded to Luis Rios, who receives \$500. Rios is on the staff of the NMSU student news website, The Round Up, and is interested in pursuing a career in investigative reporting, either in print media or broadcasting.

His editors praised Rios for his drive, dedication and passion to reporting and journalism.

"I am very proud to say that he will be one of New Mexico's leading investigative journalists in the near future," said Round Up Editor-in-Chief Alanna Herrera.

This year's scholarship chair was Jessica Savage, the Senior Scholarship Advisor for the College of Arts and Sciences at New Mexico State University. She is a longtime New Mexico Press Women member who, in 2018, received the organization's highest honor, Communicator of Achievement.

2020 Zia Award Winners Announced

New Mexico Press Women Zia Award Chair is pleased to announce the results of this year's Zia Awards Competition. NMPW started the Zia Award in 1953 to honor an outstanding New Mexico woman author. The award rotates yearly to one of three categories: nonfiction, fiction, and children/youth literature. This year, outstanding New Mexico women writers were chosen for their work in children's and youth books.

Children's Books

The first place 2020 Zia Book Award winner for children's books is *The Corn Whisperer* by Sue Houser, with art by Ramon Shiloh. Houser is a native New Mexican who retired from a career in social work/counseling. The book is a trio of stories about young Charlie's visits to his grandfather who lives at a pueblo. Grandfather relates stories about their ancient culture and how it relates to living in today's world. "The re-storytelling of these legends, through written words and authentic art, brings the tales to life to new generations of readers," one judge said.

Two honorable mentions were awarded to *Goodnight*, Los Alamos by Whitney Spivey, with illustrations by Los Alamos native Brenda Fleming, and to Home on the Rocking R Ranch, written and illustrated by Connie Perez. Spivey's work features the city on the hill as the main character, whereas Fleming's book presents colorful illustrations of life on a ranch.

Youth

The first place 2020 Zia Book Award winner for youth books is Karen Glinski's Badge of Honor. An Albuquerque resident, Glinski was born in Japan as part of a military family. Her 162-page book weaves a Navajo boy and his grandfather into a ring of thieves, a bag of stolen Native jewelry, and a Code Talker. "A nice way to weave some important history into an enjoyable story," said one judge.

Two honorable mentions were awarded to: Days of the Dead by Kersten Hamilton and to The Crossroads by Alexandra Diaz. Hamilton's 247-page book features a girl living in a fictional New Mexico town as her mother's ashes have gone missing ashes as the Day of the Dead approaches. Diaz's 303-page tale relates the journey of a Guatemalan immigrant to New Mexico who meets kindness in unexpected places.

The Coronavirus and Our Grant Program: Where Do We Go From Here?

Major grants deadline intact - Register on new Grants Management System

The sudden and unprecedented onset of the coronavirus crisis has changed our lives in dramatic ways – not least in the way we socially nteract with one another, our new need to stay six feet apart, the closure of

physical venues we have come to take for granted. Nevertheless, our May 1 grant deadline remains in effect.

Keeping in mind that the health and well-being of our communities remains our priority, we are encouraging grant applicants.

The Coronavirus and Our Grant Program: Where Do We Go From Here?
