Communications Contest now open

The 2022 New Mexico Press Women Communications Contest is open for entries. The state contest is the first tier in the National Federation of Press Women's contest. First-place winners in the state-level contest are eligible to move to the national level of judging. To be eligible to move to the national contest, the entrant must be a member in good standing with the National Federation of Press Women.

The contest is open to media people over the age of 18 regardless of gender, professional status or location. There are 61 categories covering writing, editing, photography, graphic design, radio and television, web and social media, advertising, communication programs and campaigns, public relations materials, information for the media, speeches and collegiate/education.

All work must have been published or broadcast between Jan. 1, 2021 and Dec. 31, 2021 to be eligible for entry.

In addition to the Communications Contest, NMPW has also announced the College and Graduate School Journalism Scholarships, and the Zia Book Awards Contest. The annual High School Communications Award is administered directly by the National Association of Press Women and is also now open. These competitions have different instructions and cut-off dates. Please make sure to read the detailed instructions before submitting entries.

We are also beginning to accept nominations for NMPW's Communicator of Achievement.

Anne Hillerman and James McGrath Morris have been collaborating to promote McGrath Morris' biography, Tony Hillerman: A Life, released in late October by the University of Oklahoma Press. They plan at least four joint appearances. McGrath Morris is vice president of the Northern New Mexico Chapter of NMPW. The book is his sixth biography.

Hillerman received the Rounders Award from New Mexico Agriculture Secretary Jeff Witte on Oct. 26 at the New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum in Las Cruces. The award recognizes writers, artists, musicians and others "who live, promote and articulate the western way of life." Previous recipients include author Max Evan, whose 1960 novel, The *Rounders*, gave the award its name, and historian Marc Simmons. Earlier in October, Hillerman traveled to Kearney, Nebraska where she was the city's Community Reads author. She gave a talk and conducted a writing workshop in a program sponsored by the city's public library.

Dianne Layden has been selected by the New Mexico Humanities Council to give a lecture about and Chautauqua portrayal of former Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg statewide — including judicial opinions, family life, reverence for opera, and the celebratory opera "Scalia/Ginsburg," which is now performed worldwide. Ginsburg visited Santa Fe many times and called the Santa Fe Opera the finest summer opera company in the world.

Bernalillo County appointed also appointed Layden to the Sheriff's Advisory and Review Board, created by ordinance in September 2020. She represents District 5 in Albuquerque's Northeast and Southeast Heights, east and west of Tramway. She has worked with law enforcement during more than 30 years of research on violence and service in the mid-1970s as assistant county manager for labor relations at Bernalillo County when the sheriff's deputies unionized.

Elaine Montague's travel story is a winner in the 2021 SouthWest Writers Writing Contest. *The Matter of the Platter* begins in 1911 when eight women in Ohio paint china as a wedding present for Elaine's grandparents. Through four generations, the platter narrates military family life from before WWI, through WWII and VietNam, and ending just prior to the attacks of 9/11. She is looking for suggestions about where to freelance this story.

Sharon Niederman, NMPW secretary, has been named to the board of directors of the New Mexico Humanities Council. Her term begins in January 2022. Her most recent book, *Backroads & Byways of New Mexico*, published by the Countryman Press, recently won a New Mexico-Arizona Book Award.

Written as "RJ The Story Guy," his latest young adult fantasy book, *Dragon Train* — a 2021 NMPW Finalist — was featured, as was *Trixie Finds Her* People, another NMPW Finalist in 2020. His Rio *Grande Parallax*, a New Mexico/Arizona Book Awards Finalist series — published as RJ Mirabal — is also available.

Congratulations to **Mary Morris**, winner of the 2020 Wheelbarrow Books Poetry Prize (Established) for her collection, Late Self-Portraits. Selected by judge Leila Chatti, Late Self-Portraits will be published in 2022 by MSU Press.

"Late Self-Portraits is a riveting look into the lives — and bodies — of those suffering from illness," writes Chatti. "The speaker shapeshifts, taking on the persona of various women throughout history — Joan of Arc, Frida Kahlo, Marie Curie — as well as famous men (Francis Bacon, Dylan Thomas, Jorge Luis Borges). These poems voyage to vibrant, distant places in time and geography, melding past and present."

Additionally, Kwame Dawes has selected a poem from Mary Morris's book, Dear October, as his next selection for American Life in Poetry.



Marcia Meier's 2021 book, Face, A Memoir, was shortlisted for the Eric Hoffer Book Award grand prize and won honorable mention in the memoir category. An essay based on the memoir was shortlisted for the Fish International Short Memoir Prize and appeared in the most recent issue of Reed Magazine. And, finally, her short story, Santa Anas, recently won first place in the Southwest Writers writing contest in the romance category. She said she is very grateful for the recognition

Chavez, is a "driven leader with proven success in organizing, planning, implementing and evaluating complex investigative plans and operational strategies to mitigate risks and criminal threats," the university stated.

In her current role as the United States Marshal for the District of New Mexico, she proudly serves as the first woman to be appointed to the position in New Mexico and the first Hispanic Woman to be appointed U.S. Marshal in the history of the United States Marshals Service.

From NMSU, she holds a Bachelor of Arts in Journalism and Mass Communications and earned a minor in Criminal Justice, which sparked her career interest.

She currently serves on the Director's U.S. Marshal Advisory Council and the Enhancing Employee Communication Committee for the Marshals Service, among other duties.
