# New Endowed Scholarships Established for Journalism Students

Beginning in the summer of 2024, journalism students will be able to apply for two new, endowed scholarships. The Anne and Tony Hillerman Scholarship and the Rosenstiel Scholarship will be awarded annually by a panel created by the New Mexico Community Foundation. The Hillerman Scholarship will be given to an undergraduate student. The Rosenstiel Scholarship is designated for a graduate student with an interest in the First Amendment and other Bill of Rights issues.

Anne Hillerman and her late father, Tony Hillerman, have had a longstanding relationship with both New Mexico and New Mexico writers, frequently contributing their time and assets to the writing community. Anne, an award-winning journalist and novelist, is a longtime NMPW member and past president.

Léonie Rosenstiel, current NMPW vice president, created the Rosenstiel Scholarship in recognition of the part played by journalists—and particularly by those at the *Albuquerque Journal*—in helping her to lift a gag order that curtailed her private freedom of speech and prevented her from writing, publishing, or speaking in public over a period of years.

The Foundation's panel will determine the award winners, with the advice of a representative from NMPW.

Each of the new scholarships will pay the winners \$1,000 the first year, and then vary with the size of the endowment fund after that. Contributions to both the undergraduate and graduate scholarship funds are always welcome, and can be made at: <u>https://go.abqcf.org/nmpw</u>

# NMPW 2024 New Mexico Communications Contest

Now is the time to start to review your work during the 2023 media year and enter the New Mexico Press Women's state level tier of the National Federation of Press Women's prestigious communications contest. The state contest is the first tier in the national contest. All entries are submitted through the National Federation of Press Women website.

First place winners in the state level contest are eligible to move to the national level of judging. To be eligible to move to the national contest, the entrant must be a member in good standing with the National Federation of Press Women. The contest is open to media people over the age of 18 regardless of gender, professional status or location.

There are more than 60 categories covering writing, editing, photography, graphic design, radio and television, web and social media, advertising, communication programs and campaigns, public relations materials, information for the media, speeches and collegiate/education.

All work must have been published or broadcast between January 1, 2023 and December 31, 2023 to be eligible for entry. Entry fees for New Mexico Press Women are \$25 for the first entry and \$15 for each additional entry. Nonmember fees are \$30 for the first entry and \$20 for each additional entry. Student fees are \$10 for the first and \$10 for each additional entry.

### Deadlines

Early Bird Deadline, January 17, 2024 (noon in your time zone)
A one-time \$25 fee will be assessed to all entrants after this date.
Book Final Deadline, January 31, 2024 (noon in your time zone)
Due to the extended time it takes to judge book categories, all book entries must be entered by this date.
Final Deadline, February 7, 2024 (noon in your time zone)

All remaining entries must be entered by this date.

New Mexico Press Women will pay the additional national entry fee for one qualified entry by an NMPW member (who was a paid member by January 31, 2024); \$25 national fees for additional entries by NMPW members and all entries for nonmembers must be paid by the entrant (entrants will be notified by email). # **NMPW High School Communications Contest**

The National Federation of Press Women <u>High School Communications Contest</u> is now open.

This is one of only a few nationwide communications competitions for high school students. It inspires students to do outstanding work in their quest for excellence. Because NFPW's state affiliate, New Mexico Press Women, is not hosting a contest, students may enter the NFPW At-Large High School Communications Contest. First-place winners of the at-large contest will receive an award certificate, an invitation to the National High School Luncheon at the NFPW National Conference, and a check for \$100 per first-place entry.

All first-place entries from the national contest will move to the NFPW National High School Communications Award of Excellence where they will be judged against one another. The student or team whose national first-place entry is judged best among all national first-place entries will receive an NFPW High School Communications Award of Excellence and an additional \$250 per entry. Another \$250 is be awarded to the school or program the student attends.

All contest entries must have been published, e-published, broadcast, or issued between Feb. 1, 2023 and January 31, 2024. For more detailed information at the <u>NFPW</u> <u>High School Contest</u> web page. Final deadline for entry is February 7, 2023, at noon in the entrant's time zone.



# **Communicator of Achievement Contest**

The recipient, chosen from nominations by NMPW members, is recognized for exceptional achievement in the communications field, service to NMPW/NFPW and to the community.

All nominees must be living members, in good standing for at least two years in NMPW and NFPW.

Specifics on building a nomination packet, rules for entry, nomination form and more will be posted here when they are announced by NFPW later this year. # Writing to Heal: Free Memoir Workshop for Veterans (a Reminder)

SouthWest Writers (SWW) is pleased to announce that it has received a 2024 New Mexico Arts (NMA) grant in support of using creative writing to heal. It is inviting eligible NMPW members to participate.

New Mexico veterans or active-duty military can apply to take a free four-week online memoir writing course taught by Latayne Scott, author of some 30 published books.

Selected enrollees will pace themselves through online modules and post their writing assignments on a private page where other students and the instructor will record comments. Computer competence is required. The modules are not taught using Zoom but are online, just as courses are taught today in schools and colleges. This cycle, the program funded by NMA is only for New Mexico veterans and activeduty military. A New Mexico participant must be either a current resident of the state or, if on active-duty, still a legal resident. The applicant's official Home of Record is New Mexico, votes, has a car registered, and the driver's license is from New Mexico.

The course is expected to start in February 2024, and admittance is limited. Priority will be given to applicants from remote areas of the state (such as Silver City, Clovis, Farmington, or Clayton) and to those who have not yet written a memoir.

### Albuquerque Chapter Report – December 2023

Karen Wentworth reports that Albuquerque Press Women and Friends have had a wide variety of speakers in the last quarter.

In September, Albuquerque Press Women and Friends heard from two current Albuquerque Public School Board Members about the problems the school board is facing in dealing with a public school district that has rapidly declining enrollment.

October brought a serious discussion of guns in Albuquerque, with Gilbert Gallegos, a former journalist and now spokesperson for the Albuquerque Police Department discussing the problems of juveniles who break into cars and trucks looking for guns to steal. Gilbert also talked about the growing problem of ghost guns in Albuquerque.

In November, Barbara Webber from Health Action New Mexico spoke to us about the changing health insurance environment in the state and the new problems with Medicaid recipients who have had to reapply under federal regulations. Only a fraction of the eligible people have actually done the paperwork to reapply, leaving thousands of people in New Mexico without any kind of health insurance.

Sunnier times are coming up in December when we will discuss the growing solar panel industry. APWF is picking up new members, many of them retired politicians who are simply interested in some intelligent conversation.



#### Northern New Mexico Chapter Report – December 2023

The November meeting featured Senator Peter Wirth. He discussed the upcoming 30 Day session and the budget considerations with approximately \$5m in new funds to budget. Joining Senator Wirth was his wife Santa Fe City Councilor Carol Romero Wirth, discussing legislation and the Santa Fe City Council's issues.

Members Tom Johnson and his wife Dorothy Bracey were the gracious hosts of the Summer networking gathering at their home.

Plans for a February 2024 meeting include a former legislator to recap the 30 day session and offer her/his analysis bills and of the budgeting plans.

# A Tribute to Colleen Keane -- A Life Well Lived



Colleen Ann Keane

Colleen Ann Keane, 74, died on October 26, 2023. Her life's work gave voice to others as she advocated on social and economic issues throughout Arizona, New Mexico and Native nations. Using her talent and skills in radio, television, photography and print, Native American victims of child abuse, domestic violence, and health inequities were heard. She called out state, federal and tribal governments when indigenous rights were lost within their bureaucratic webs of social services.

After earning a Master's in Social Work at Arizona State University, Colleen found work in the Arizona child welfare system. The experience exposed her to the blanket disregard for indigenous parental rights prior to the passage of the Indian Child Welfare Act in 1978. On the Arizona Governor's Task Force to investigate abuse in foster care institutions, she saw the "warehousing" of thousands of Native children as they were separated from their families. It was a sad period in which she "gave up" social work.

At the Navajo Community College in 1979, she helped to develop Navajo regulations to return children to their families under the newly passed Indian Child Welfare Act. Relying on her Arizona experiences, she and Nancy Evans, the first Navajo social worker, wrote the Navajo Nation standards for Foster Care services. Their non-bureaucratic approach involved consultation with Navajo elders, Hatalthi (healers) and families. These regulations continue to guide today's social workers. Her efforts within the tribal community gave Colleen lifelong skills of respect and the ability to listen carefully for cultural values and traditions that guided Navajo (Diné) daily life.

She earned a second Master's in Broadcast Journalism at the University of Southern California (USC). In her first semester, she wrote a television script about the 1979 United Nuclear Corporation uranium tailings spill that affected the health and livelihood of many Navajo people living along the Rio Puerco. USC chose it as a student production, and she directed its filming, showing the impact of low-level radioactivity and ground water contamination on livestock and humans. When USC claimed the copyright, she prevailed in her appeal for intellectual property rights. This documentary, The River That Harms (45 min.), won local, national and international awards, and continues to be shown, both within the United States and internationally.

Returning to Alamo and Ramah, chapters on the Navajo Nation, Colleen taught radio broadcasting to high school students who manned local radio stations. She wrote and photographed a children's book, American Indian Radio Voices, published by Zaner-Bloser, that introduces American Indian radio stations on reservations throughout the United States. She highlighted their unique broadcasting, speaking English and also their own Native language. It is still available as an audiobook through Barnes and Noble.

Colleen produced many television programs for the Navajo Nation. She coined the title Modern Day Monsters for a film on child abuse. Another, To Be The Best, focused on tribal justice in domestic violence. These films continue to train Navajo staff today. Strong Voices for the Pollen Path, about the Navajo Nation Women's Commission describes their work and needs of the Navajo people. Her photographs recorded the Miss Navajo Council's Hero Twins Workshop for Navajo boys and the Navajo Nation Hall of Fame, as well as numerous other activities within the Navajo Nation. Returning to Alamo and Ramah, chapters on the Navajo Nation, Colleen taught radio broadcasting to high school students who manned local radio stations. She wrote and photographed a children's book, American Indian Radio Voices, published by Zaner-Bloser, that introduces American Indian radio stations on reservations throughout the United States. She highlighted their unique broadcasting in speaking English and also their own Native language. It continues as an audiobook through Barnes and Noble.

Challenging a wider market, Colleen wrote and filmed a series, in 2012, of live forums about racism, Erase the Hate, at KNME-TV in Albuquerque, New Mexico. During the last ten years, Colleen worked as a reporter for the Navajo Times, the newspaper covering the Navajo Nation. Weekly articles informed the public about issues and events within the nation and nearby towns.

Always an advocate, her stories on adults who had been adopted as children gave a poignant view of the loss of cultural identity and the grief of separation from families. She pointed out the need for better care and accessible facilities for the disabled, mentally ill and blind. Other stories dealt with water pipelines, improvements for schools, and violence against Navajos in urban cities. No topic deterred her interest in making life better for others.

A deep interest in her Irish heritage led her to Ireland, to research family history and write the 2022 book, *Crashing the American Wake*, about her Irish father leaving his homeland for America, where he married the daughter of a Montana rancher. Colleen saw the history of the Irish people as similar to Native Americans through loss of their lands and suppression of their culture. She held dual Irish and U. S. citizenship.

An active member of the Board for the New Mexico Press Women's Association, Colleen was Chair of the Doris Gregory Memorial Journalism Scholarship and received numerous state and national awards for her writings in areas of Religion, Social Issues, Education, History, Arts and Entertainment.

Colleen is survived by her daughter, Joanna Keane Lopez. In honoring Colleen and her love of dancing, an Irish celebration of her life was held with her favorite local band. Collen's life was filled with adventure, goodwill, and hope for the future, she will be dearly missed.

New Mexico Press Women and Las Cruces Press Women are sad to share that Jessica Savage died on December 3, 2023. She passed peacefully, surrounded by loved ones.

Jessica was an active member of the New Mexico Press Women, serving on the board for seven years, as public relations chair for almost two years, as chair of the Scholarship Committee for two years, as Zia Book Award Committee chair for six years, and as state conference co-chair in 2017. In 2018, she received the Communicator of Achievement award, New Mexico Press Women's highest honor. Jessica also served on the board of Las Cruces Press Women.

Born in Italy while her father served in the United States Navy, Jessica spent most of her childhood and adult life in Las Cruces.
