The Albuquerque Journal series helped expose problems and push toward some solutions. Here from journalists and individuals who experienced guardianship traumas.

The legacy of Indian boarding school system dates to the mid-nineteenth century when federal Indian Agents forcibly abducted children as young as four from their homes and enrolled them in church- and government-run boarding schools, often far-removed from their tribes and families. The tragedy that ensued has been dramatically braided into "1923," a television show in the Yellowstone Universe of television shows.

Although the problem of missing and murdered Indigenous women is a national problem, it is worse in New Mexico than any other state. In late 2019, a task force was formed within the NM Indian Affairs Department to "to determine the scope of the problem, identify barriers and create partnerships to improve processes for reporting and investigating cases." In May 2022, the task force issued its Response Plan. This panel will discuss the background of the problem and what the task force's recommendations are.
