That contest will begin in January and we are looking for career professionals to enter or be nominated for this organization's highest form of recognition. The winner from New Mexico will be entered into the National contest.

The decision on which developer will do the NMPW Website redesign was made on October 23, 2024 and we are hoping the new website will be up by the end of this year.

2025 Zia Book Award Contest

Women authors of fiction books who have a significant connection to New Mexico are encouraged to enter the New Mexico Press Women's Zia Book Award contest. The 2025 Zia Award will be given to an outstanding fiction book (novel) published between 2022 and 2024.

Entry categories are judged on a rotating three-year cycle. Adult fiction books will be considered in 2025. Children's books will be considered in 2026. Adult nonfiction books will be considered in 2027.

Submissions may be made by the author or by someone else on behalf of the author, such as a publisher. Membership in New Mexico Press Women is not required (although it provides a discounted entry fee). However, the writer must be a woman who lives in or has a strong connection to New Mexico. The book may be published anywhere.

Selected finalists must be available to read at the annual award luncheon during the 2024 conference on Saturday, March 22, 2025.

SouthWest Writers, a Sister Organization, Celebrates Its 40th Anniversary

On October 12, SouthWest Writers (SWW), whose motto is "Writers Helping Writers," celebrated its 40th anniversary at the UNM Continuing Education Building in Albuquerque. Of its 400 members, 64 attended in person and another 40 celebrated over Zoom. About one-third of its members attend its 30-plus meetings, each year, via the internet.

Charter SWW members include best-selling authors. A few of them are: romance writer Parris Afton Bonds, mystery authors Joanna Blaylock and Kay Lewis Shaw, children's book author Elsie Karr Kreischer, mystery writer Tony Hillerman, humorist Eileen Stanton and historical novelist Paula Paul.

In 2008 the Albuquerque Arts Alliance awarded SWW its prestigious Bravo Award for Outstanding Arts Organization. A grant from the City of Albuquerque's Cultural Affairs office sponsored the publication of *KiMo Theater: Fact & Folklore* which garnered several awards. SWW's 2020 writing contest resulted in an anthology of winning entries entitled *Seeing the World in 2020*.

SouthWest Writers holds writing challenges and competitions meant to hone writing skills, including monthly writing challenges as well as calls for entries into our annual short story and poetry contest.

Recently we have worked with the State of New Mexico's Arts & the Military office to offer training and publishing opportunities to New Mexico Veterans and their families. Their 2023 Anthology "*Holes in Our Hearts*" was given an award by the Military Writers Society of America. Many NMPW members contributed to this venture, including Joe Badal, Jim Tritten, Sherri Burr, and Léonie Rosenstiel.

SWW earns most of its operating income through membership and event fees, along with some local grants. Volunteers do most of the work, with the assistance of a part-time office staff.

Bill Church, the new executive editor of *The Santa Fe New Mexican*, was the speaker at the lunch meeting of the Northern New Mexico Press Women on October 26, at Joe's Dining in Santa Fe.

Church was introduced by James McGrath Morris, who as usual had done his homework and shared interesting insights about Church.

Church has held editorial positions at the *Sarasota Herald-Tribune*, which won the 2016 Pulitzer Prize for investigative reporting under his leadership, the *Austin American-Statesman* and most recently, *The News & Observer* in Raleigh, NC. He is a graduate of the University of Oklahoma and Central Michigan University.

After moving to his new position with the *The New Mexican*, Church wrote this in a September 22 commentary:

"Local journalism should have the same connection as a single whole. Great communities begat great newspapers, and vice versa. But most of the country's local newspapers these days are owned by publicly held or privately equitized companies and the single whole that should link journalism and communities has been commoditized and squeezed much like fast-food franchises that ration condiment packages.

"Not here. My favorite part of *The Santa Fe New Mexican* masthead is this statement: 'Locally owned and independent, founded 1849.' No shareholder meetings — our mission is about this community; it is about you."
