

New Mexico Press Women Contests

Communications Contest Is Open!

It's kick-off time for more than just football.

The 2026 New Mexico Press Women Communications kick off on October 15, 2025. The state contest is the first tier in the National Federation of Press Women (NFPW) contest. Entries are submitted through the NFPW's Communications Contest portal.

There are 63 categories in a wide range of communication categories, including writing, books, photography, graphics and design, radio and television, web and social media, advertising, public relations materials, communication programs, speeches, information for the media, and collegiate/education. There is a place for everyone.

The New Mexico Press Women's Communications Contests are judged at the state level. A unique aspect is that first-place winners in the state-level contest are eligible to move to the national level of judging — most other contests are regional- or state-level only. NM Press Women also gives out cash prizes to high point winners.

You do not have to be a member of NM Press Women to enter, but to be eligible to move to the national contest, you must be a member in good standing with the National Federation.

of Press Women. If you are not a member of our organizations, please join us in having an impact and being inspiring during the current uncertain media and communication climate.

A panel of a dozen or more out-of-state judges is carefully selected and matched with categories where they have expertise. The judges give thoughtful and useful comments (even if they might sting a little). The judges are there to help entrants become more proficient in their craft.

All work must have been published or broadcast between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, to be eligible for entry. There is an early bird deadline of noon on January 21, 2026, after which, a \$25 fee will be assessed. The book entry deadline is noon on February 4, with a final noon February 18 deadline for all other entries. State -level contest winners will be announced at the annual NMPW conference, planned for May 1–2, 2026, at the Isleta Hotel and Resort.

As contest co-director, it is fun and inspiring to view the entries as they come in. Entries are vetted individually to make sure they are in the correct category and complete.

New Mexico multi-media folks and wordsmiths are a talented, unique collection of storytellers. Find your best work and encourage your friends and colleagues to enter their work, photos, or other published pieces. It's fun and who knows — you could be the next national winner representing the best of New Mexico.

New Mexico Press Women's Zia Book Award

Every year since 1953, the NM Presswomen has honored an outstanding New Mexico woman author with its prestigious Zia Award. This year, the award will be given to the author of the best children's book who has significant ties to the state. Entries will be accepted beginning November 1, 2025, through January 29, 2026.

The Zia Awards program operates on a threeyear cycle and awards books in three categories: fiction, nonfiction, and children's literature. This year, the award is open to children's authors whose books were published in 2023, 2024, and 2025. Entries should have a strong connection to New Mexico through their settings, characters, and/or themes.

Submissions can be made by the author or someone else on behalf of the author, such as a publisher. Membership in New Mexico Press Women is not required, although it provides a discounted entry fee. The writer must be a woman who lives in or has a strong connection to New Mexico. The book may be published anywhere.


To submit for consideration for the Zia Book Award, send a brief cover letter including complete contact information, the author's biography, a brief description of the book, three copies of the book or one copy of the ebook by January 29, 2026. Entries should be sent to Dede Feldman, Zia Awards Chair, 1821 Meadow View Drive NW, Albuquerque, NM 87104.

The entry fee is \$30 for non-members; \$25 for members until December 31; thereafter, \$35 for members and \$50 for non-members); you

may also join New Mexico Press Women at the time you enter but membership is not required for eligibility. Please send a check payable to NMPW to Linda Lockett, NMPW Treasurer, 3 Tierra Madre Road, Placitas, NM 87043.

To be eligible to receive the award, the selected finalists must be available to read at the annual award luncheon during the NMPW 2026 Conference on Saturday, May 2, 2026.

Four writers then gave readings, including Damien Willis reading four poems; Cassie reading five of her commentary columns; Denise giving a theatrical reading from her latest book, *Street of Too Many Stories*; and Regina reading from her book, *Sins of the System*. There was a theme about gun culture in our country and the burden it is to our children. Every reading was riveting and many were emotional.

The artists included **Rosa Armijo-Pemble** (board member), **María Baca, Sondra Bradshaw, Jake Hale, Rosa M**, and **Daniel Zolinsky**. Sondra and Rosa M traveled from Deming to be with us. Rosa displayed her wonderful photography, as did Daniel. María, Sondra, Jake, and Rosa M displayed

beautiful paintings and other work. It was delightful to barter with Rosa M and make a heartfelt connection with these beautiful artists.



People stayed and perused and shared for some time while enjoying the bountiful snacks and treats that participants brought to share. There were about 30 participants and the entire event felt magical. People truly connected. Connections Made with and Through Yolanda Nava

The **National Hispanic Cultural Center (NHCC)** proudly welcomed acclaimed, award-winning Mexican American broadcast journalist, celebrated author, and activist Yolanda Nava for a powerful two-day event, free to the public. On October 2 at 6:30 p.m. Nava captivated the audience with the deeply personal and inspirational story behind her memoir *Through the Dark*. She recounted her harrowing battle with a mysterious illness that ultimately proved to be a rare autoimmune disease, which left her legally blind. Despite the trauma and darkness, Nava shared how she found the strength to move forward and offered a message of resilience and hope.

Nava's legacy spans
decades as a pioneer in the
media and a longtime
advocate for civil rights. In
addition to Through the
Dark, she is the author of
It's All in the Frijoles: 100
Famous Latinos Share Real
Life Stories, Time-Tested
Dichos, and Favorite Folk
Tales — an exploration of
Latino values and cultural
wisdom.

Born and raised in Los Angeles, CA, Nava is recognized for her groundbreaking career in journalism. She was the first woman of Mexican heritage

to appear on KNBC, a network affiliate in Los Angeles. Her career spanned local, national, and international news, as she interviewed prominent figures such as Leslie Stahl and Isabel Allende.

In 2003, Nava joined Governor Bill Richardson's administration and served in executive roles in the New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs, which included leadership positions at the Museums and Monuments of New Mexico and the National Hispanic Cultural Center.

On October 4 at 10:00 a.m., a group of authors, aspiring writers, and those who felt a connection to Nava gathered for a writer's workshop — although most didn't know each other. Nava reflected on her life, sharing personal stories and her ties to New Mexico.

During the workshop, Nava explained that there is no right or wrong way to write. Everyone has their own perspective because if we are honest in what we share and make no attempt to cover it up but to show the good, bad and ugly, what is written helps others get through their own challenges. As each person shared their journey and a piece they had written, they not only connected with Yolanda Nava but also formed a bond with one another.

Nava's final piece of advice to workshop attendees was "sometimes you astound yourself. I do. Cross-connections are made as life has a way of cycling back and forth. Creative work comes through us. There is something within all that tells us to write."




Kathleen M. Rodgers

Northern New Mexico Communicators Salon - December 6, 2025


