NMPW Names Burr its 2021 Communicator of Achievement

New Mexico Press Women is pleased to announce that Sherri Burr has been awarded New Mexico Press Women's highest honor as the recipient of the 2021 Communicator of Achievement award. The Communicator of Achievement Award is bestowed upon those members who have distinguished themselves within and beyond their profession.

The recipient, chosen from nominations by NMPW members, is recognized for exceptional achievement in the communications field, and for service to New Mexico Press Women, National Federation of Press Women, and to the community. All nominees must be living members, in good standing for at least two years in NMPW and NFPW.

Sherri Burr

Sherri Burr will represent New Mexico in the NFPW competition. The national COA and the runner-up will be announced at the Communicator of Achievement Award Banquet at NFPW's annual conference in June. Sherri survived a turbulent childhood to attend Mount Holyoke College, Princeton University and Yale Law School.

Elected President of New Mexico Press Women in 2018, she has led the organization through the pandemic, and was unanimously re-elected last year. After celebrating NMPW's 70th Anniversary in 2019, Burr had to cancel the 2020 conference and spearhead changes to the bylaws to permit online meetings and voting.

Burr is a communicator of extraordinary depth, having been a law professor for over 30 years, a columnist for The Albuquerque Tribune, and the author of over two dozen award-winning books and hundreds of articles. She also produced a television show and spearheaded the launch of a not-for-profit art gallery. In 2015, she received a Monticello Fellowship to work on Complicated Lives: Free Blacks in Virginia, 1619–1865, which, after being published in 2019, was nominated for the Pulitzer Prize in History. Sherri currently serves on the Authors Guild Foundation Board, which educates and advocates for the rights of all authors.


NMPW Announces 2021 Scholarship Winners

New Mexico Press Women announces recipients of this year's Doris Gregory Scholarships. Gregory was an award-winning member of NMPW and the National Federation of Press Women in the 1950s and '60s. A correspondent for the El Paso Times for 12 years, Gregory was also a public relations professional, a magazine editor, and an association executive. The Doris Gregory Memorial Scholarship, established after her death from cancer in 1969, is awarded every year to New Mexico college or university students studying communications and journalism. NMPW thanks the following donors to the fund: the Northern Chapter of NMPW for making contributions in the name of Roslyn K. "Roz" Pulitzer, a friend and supporter of the Northern New Mexico Press Women, and Don Strel, a photographer member who passed away last year, the Albuquerque Chapter of NMPW, and the generous press women members and friends who contributed on Giving Tuesday 2020.

This year's recipients are both New Mexico State University Freshmen. First-place winner Xavier Dominguez, studying Journalism and Mass Communications, will receive \$1,000. Runner-up Sarah Roderick, studying Agricultural Communications, will receive \$500.




2020 Zia Award Winners Announced

NM Press Women Announces Zia Award Winners New Mexico Press Women is pleased to announce that **Jennifer Hull**'s Shook: An Earthquake, A Legendary Mountain Guide, and Everest's Deadliest Day (UNM Press, 2020) has won the 2021 Zia Book Award.

The Zia Book Award started in 1953 to honor an outstanding woman in New Mexico media. Each year the award rotates to between three categories: nonfiction, fiction, and children's literature. The 2021 contest considered nonfiction books published in 2018, 2019, and 2020.

Jennifer Hull is a writer and a teacher. She grew up in New York, graduated cum laude from Cornell University with a bachelor's degree in history, and has a master's degree in education. She has taught K-12 students as well as college freshmen at the Taos campus of the University of New Mexico. She lives in New Mexico, with her husband, twin sons and cocker spaniel.

Shook tells a story of resilience, nerve, and survival on the deadliest day on Everest. Dave Hahn, a local of Taos, New Mexico, is a legendary figure in mountaineering. Elite members of the climbing community have likened him to the Michael Jordan, Cal Ripkin or Michael Phelps of the climbing world. Yet, none of his experience could have prepared him, his crew and clients for the earthquake that shook Everest and all of their lives on the morning of April 25, 2015.

Susan spoke about writing and about her brand-new memoir, Bless the Birds: Living with Love in a Time of Dying. In the book, Susan tells the story of her journey after her husband, Richard Cabe, was diagnosed with a brain cancer that would kill him two years later. Her journey starts from pre-diagnosis through the end of his life, and she focuses on the importance of a mindful existence and connection to nature that help both of them through the profound adjustments in their lives and in their marriage.
